Updates:

- Steve Simonson shared an update from Billings Chamber – Steve shared the need for broadband and shared the letter. Response was favorable.

Allison Corbyn Update:

- Moving forward with lobbyist for broadband issues. Currently striving to find the right path for traction. There is broad interest in broadband. MEDA could play a role in advocating for the NON-status quo. Set the goals for high performance broadband policy in Montana.

Allison shared numbers: any business that has a connection of 60/5 or less would be eligible. Also, if providers used the grant they would have to provide 100/100 service.

Discussion:

- Get behind both – Big Sky EDA’s effort as well as laying the ground for future MEDA work.
- To get momentum, may need to do similar to MIC – form a coalition and hire an Executive Director. Consider that model. Needs some funding, too.
- Perhaps encourage Governor Gianforte to pursue a broadband expert.
- Russ asked what are other states striving for? Perhaps 100 is not efficient – need a gig.
